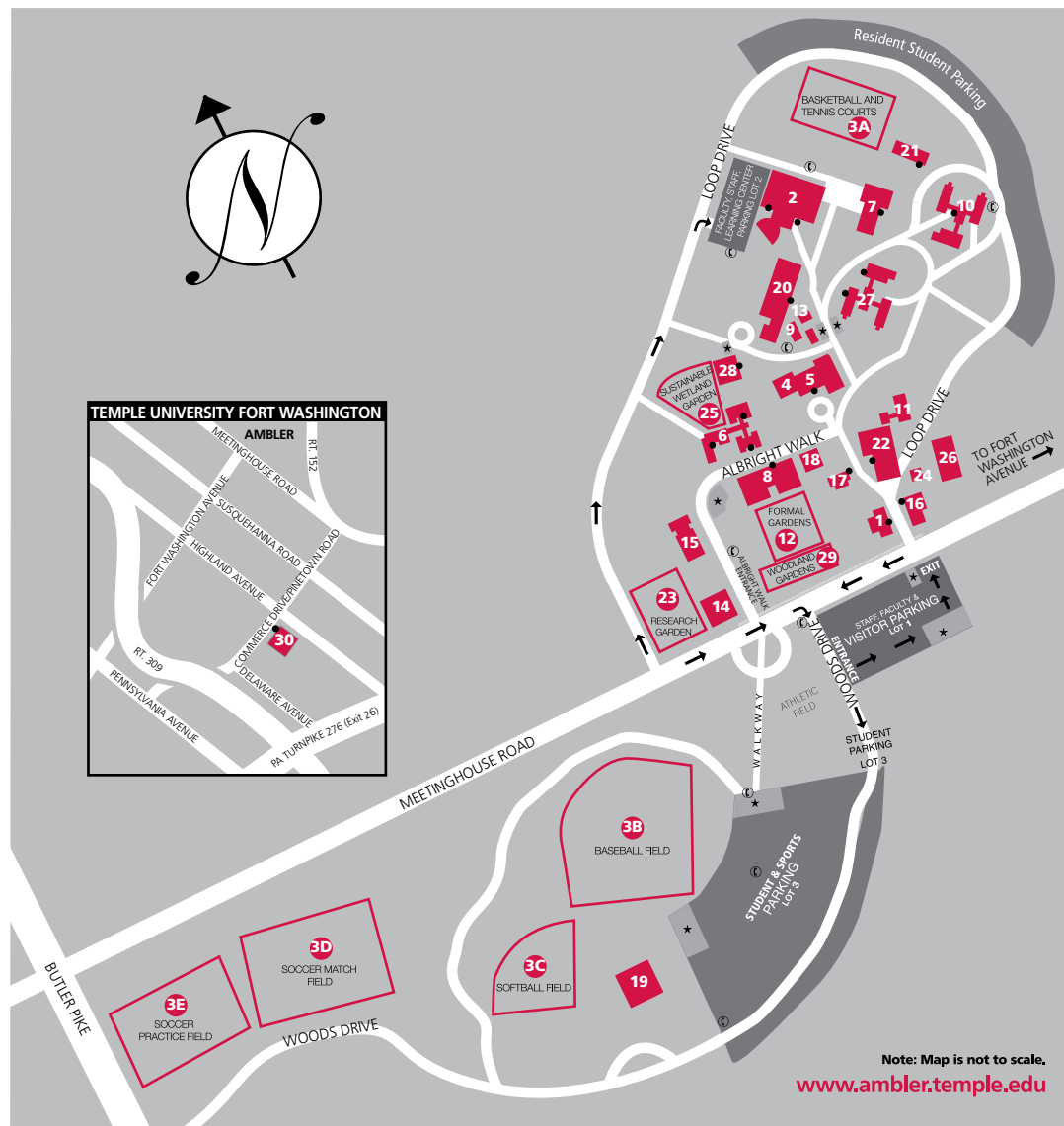

About the University

With more than 39,000 students and 17 schools and colleges, Temple University is a world-class comprehensive research and teaching university. Located midway between New York City and Washington, D.C., Temple offers a broad range of academic programs that attracts students from every state in the United States and from more than 100 foreign nations.

The university has more than 3,200 full-time and part-time faculty members, many with national and international reputations. It is one of the top 100 institutions doing research for the federal government and has one of only three university-based national survey research facilities in the nation.

Temple offers bachelor's degrees in more than 130 fields, master's degrees in 121 and doctoral degrees in 56. The university also offers programs in seven first professional degree areas.

A member of the Pennsylvania Commonwealth System of Higher Education, Temple University is governed by a 36-member Board of Trustees. The university's primary sources of support are an annual appropriation from the Commonwealth and student tuition.

To Temple University Ambler

From Temple University's Main Campus and points south: Take Broad Street North to Cheltenham Avenue, approximately 6 miles. Turn left onto Cheltenham Avenue. Follow signs for Route 309 North. Turn right onto Route 309 and proceed about 6½ miles. Take the Susquehanna Road exit and turn left onto Susquehanna Road. Turn right onto Butler Pike. Turn right onto Meetinghouse Road. Proceed approximately ½ mile to Temple University Ambler. Turn left onto Loop Drive for parking in Lot 2 (faculty and staff) or turn right for parking in Lot 1 (faculty, staff, visitors) and Lot 3 (students).

From points north via Route 309:

Follow Route 309 South and take the exit for Butler Pike. Turn left onto Butler Pike. Turn right onto Meetinghouse Road. Proceed approximately ½ mile to Temple University Ambler. Turn left onto Loop Drive for parking in Lot 2 (faculty and staff) or turn right for parking in Lot 1 (faculty, staff, visitors) and Lot 3 (students).

From the east: (Abington, Huntingdon Valley) Take Susquehanna Road West. Turn right onto Butler Pike. Turn right onto Meetinghouse Road. Proceed approximately ½ mile to Temple University Ambler. Turn left onto Loop Drive for parking in Lot 2 (faculty and staff) or turn right for parking in Lot 1 (faculty, staff, visitors) and Lot 3 (students).

From the west: (Reading, Pottstown, Limerick) Take Route 422 East to Route 202 North. Briefly take 202 North to I-76 West (look for signs to Pennsylvania Turnpike). Take I-76 briefly to Pennsylvania Turnpike and follow directions from Pennsylvania Turnpike below.

From the south via I-95: Take I-95 to I-476 exit. Follow I-476 North 18 miles to Pennsylvania Turnpike exit. Take Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-276) East to Exit 339 and follow directions from Pennsylvania Turnpike below.

From the Pennsylvania Turnpike: Take Exit 339 (Fort Washington) and follow signs for Route 309 North. Proceed on 309 North to the Susquehanna Road exit. Turn left onto Susquehanna Road. Turn right onto Butler Pike. Turn right onto Meetinghouse Road. Proceed approximately ½ mile to Temple University Ambler. Turn left onto Loop Drive for parking in Lot 2 (faculty and staff) or turn right for parking in Lot 1 (faculty, staff, visitors) and Lot 3 (students).

From New Jersey via the Lambertville–New Hope Bridge: Take Route 202 South to Route 152 East (Limekiln Pike). Turn right onto Fort Washington Avenue. Turn right onto Meetinghouse Road. Proceed approximately ½ mile to Temple University Ambler. Turn left onto Loop Drive for parking in Lot 2 (faculty and staff) or turn right for parking in Lot 1 (faculty, staff, visitors) and Lot 3 (students).

From New Jersey via the New Jersey Turnpike: Take New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 6 which connects you to the Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-276). Follow directions from Pennsylvania Turnpike in the previous column.

From New Jersey via Tacony-Palmyra Bridge: After crossing the bridge, stay straight to continue onto Levick Street. Turn right onto Frankford Avenue. Turn left onto Cottman Avenue/PA 73 West. (This becomes Township Line Road.) Proceed for approximately 6 miles and turn left onto Washington Lane. Turn right onto Church Road/PA 73 West. Make a slight left onto Greenwood Avenue. Turn right onto Route 309 North. Take the Susquehanna Road exit and turn left onto road. Turn right onto Butler Pike. Turn right onto Meetinghouse Road. Proceed approximately ½ mile to Temple University Ambler. Turn left onto Loop Drive for parking in Lot 2 (faculty and staff) or turn right for parking in Lot 1 (faculty, staff, visitors) and Lot 3 (students).

Public Transportation to Temple University Ambler

SEPTA Regional Rail Lines:

The Lansdale-Doylestown line stops at the Ambler train station on the hour. The university provides free bus service to and from Temple University Ambler during the fall and spring semesters.

"94" Bus: Runs from Germantown Avenue and Bethlehem Pike (end of Chestnut Hill West Regional Rail Line and "23" Trolley line) to the Ambler train station. The University provides free bus service to and from Temple University Ambler during the fall and spring semesters.

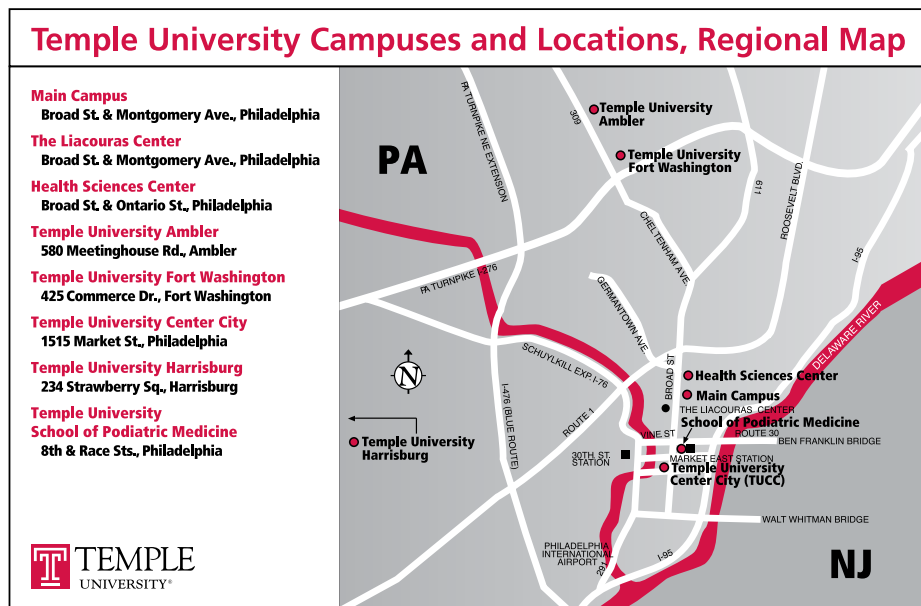
Ambler Arboretum
